- What are the risks?



Strategy-internal factors


- Mismatch between goals/strategies, and the programs and policy instruments applied to fulfil them
- Implementation challenges (ambition, ability, resources)
- Multi-level complexity: translating EU/national goals to local contexts, administrative filtering





















Strategy-external factors

- Conflicts between different environmental strategies
- Incompatibility with strategies and political practices in other policy areas
- Mismatch with agendas and actions of businesses, civil society organisations, and individuals












A lack of action coherence...

- Different logics for different types of strategies
- One specific goal, or a broader target
- Cross-scale interactions
- Vertical interplay of goals, strategies, and actions
- ...is an important cause of failed goal attainment













Overall program aim

- To advance our knowledge about <u>existing policy barriers</u> and to provide concrete recommendations on how to improve contemporary and future climate and biodiversity strategies in order to <u>avoid goal-conflicts and controversies and foster policy</u> <u>synergies</u>, thereby achieving better policy implementation
 - 1. Which are the main public strategies promoting climate and biodiversity goals in Sweden, and how can they be analysed?
 - 2. What are the main barriers in, and to the implementation of, strategies aiming for climate mitigation and adaptation and a rich biodiversity, and how could these be navigated?
 - 3. How could future policy-making and decision-making on sustainable development be performed in order to prevent barriers and reap synergies?










What do we study?

- One SubProject (SP) to map the strategy landscape, and provide an overview of climate and biodiversity strategies, including strategies that might be counteractive
- Five SPs, each focusing barriers and potential synergies from different perspectives, and across multiple societal/administrative levels











How do we do it?

- A multidisciplinary program...
 - Gathering leading scholars from the social- and environmental sciences
 - Four different institutions across Sweden
- ...with a mixed-methods approach
 - Surveys and survey-experiments
 - Interviews and policy analysis
 - Co-learning, roundtables, workshops, focus-groups
- Stakeholder interactions and knowledge exchange is key!








The Sami Act, chapter 4 (2021)

- The Sami parliament and other representatives of Sami interests have the right to be consulted in cases that may affect Sami interests directly
- Applies to government bodies at all levels







ICCPR Article 27

What are consultations?



More than the right to be heard



To be conducted in «good faith»



Achieving agreement is the objective



The process must be documented

§ 4-1 Saker som er gjenstand for konsultasjoner
